Opening Remarks

The present Newsletter is the first issue of 2001. The Project Management Committee wishes everybody health, happiness and success in the new year.

Before the establishment of the Project's General Network Office under the China Law Society on June 10, 2000, the work of different sub-projects had already begun. During the period between June 17th and the end of July, 2000, funds from the Ford Foundation as well as Dutch, Swedish and Norwegian sponsors were successively received as the first financial investment in our project. Rapid progress was made afterwards and exciting achievements were obtained during the second half of the year. Every network participant, including sub-project directors, management committee members and workers employed in our projects, all contributed a great deal of their labor, wisdom and energy into the project. Some colleagues had an extremely heavy workload. We all know that our efforts are for a world free of violence and for a new millenium of sex equality, development and peace. The Project Management Committee would like to express heartfelt regards and sincere thanks to all workers, advisors and sub-project directors.

It is worth mentioning that due to our effective work, we have not only established a network among Beijing participants and a well-organized mechanism through which information and material can be shared among all participants, but we have also successfully conducted three network seminars and a conference in commemoration of the International Day for the Elimination of Domestic Violence against Women, which created a very positive social influence. We have already begun to set up networks outside Beijing, which involve organizations from Hebei, Hubei, Hunan, Liaoning, Inner Mongolia and Gansu. By joining our networks, those organizations can share information, jointly conduct research and cooperate in formulating policies and intervention measures in response to domestic violence.

The present newsletter is a special issue presenting annual reports on each sub-project which highlight achievements during the year, particularly the second half of 2000. Due to space limitations, financial reports will be presented separately.

In accordance with the principle of openness and transparency, financial inputs and expenditures for both the general project and each sub-project will be reported in the forthcoming 4th Network Seminar for review and assessment by all network participants.

The Newsletter provides a chance for all participants to share resources, exchange ideas and experiences and promote the objectives of our projects. We hope all participants can make full use of the Newsletter and actively contribute papers. Any suggestions and criticisms are welcome.

Briefs on Recent Activities

1. On December 25, 2000, the "New Year's Tea Party & 3rd Network Seminar" was held in the multi-function hall of the China Law Society. The seminar was chaired by urban community intervention sub-project director Mr. Li Hongtao, a member of the Project Management Committee. Attendees included officials and experts from different departments and organizations.

2. On January 3, 2001, a training workshop was conducted in the office room of the Information Center. Professor Du Fangqing from the Women's Study Center of Tianjin Normal University gave lectures to participants. She stressed that recording women's oral complaints was not only an approach for study but also an important means from a political perspective. By articulating what they have experienced, women could regain their confidence and realize they are entitled to rights. Professor Du also discussed how to establish an equal and interactive relationship with women complainants. The lecture was regarded as very helpful for implementation of the sub-project.

3. On January 12, 2001, a pilot investigation, as part of the Judicial Survey Sub-project, was conducted by the Beijing Xuanwu District Judicial Bureau. 300 copies of a questionnaire were filled out by persons from the local public security organ, the procuratorate, the court and the people's congress. Changes were made to the questionnaire as a result of the pilot investigation. A formal judicial survey was thus fully prepared.

4. After consultation and deliberation, it was recently decided to have Zhongshi Accounting Office conduct an audit of the project. An agreement is to be signed on February 26, 2001.

5. The questionnaire-based survey was originally scheduled for January 15 – 17, 2001

but was delayed by bad weather until February 12 – 15, 2001.

6. On February 9 – 10, 2001, a second training workshop was conducted at China Women's College for Project Management Committee members and sub-project directors.

7. From February 19th to March 2, 2001, project assessment is to be conducted. Assessing officers are to meet all network partners, inspect urban community work and meet community intervention directors and concerned sub-project participants. A general network conference is to be held to exchange ideas from the assessment and to deliberate over future work.

Temporary Provisions Governing Borrowing Books and Materials From the Information Center

With a view of assisting all project participants to do research, investigation and assessment work, all books and materials, whether collected, translated or purchased by the Information Center for Anti- Domestic Violence Against Women, are now open to all project participants. To make full use of those books and materials, the present provisions are adopted with the purpose of providing convenience for both readers and management.

I. All project participants, including researchers, staff and volunteers, are allowed to borrow books and journals.

II. Borrowing Procedures

1. Only ordinary academic books and journals are allowed to be checked out of the Information Center. Reference books, journals and newspapers with only one copy retained by the Information Center may be read at the office of the Information Center but cannot be checked out.

2. Books and journals newly acquired by the Information Center should be kept first for exhibition at the Center for half a month, during which time they may not be checked out (exceptions will be made when more than one copy is available). At the end of the exhibition period, new books and journals may be checked out. Reservations to borrow such materials may be made in advance.

3. Catalogues and sub-catalogues of book titles and authors' names are available. Readers may use the catalogues to look up their desired book or journal. Borrowers should fill out a form and go through other required procedures. When using the catalogues please keep the cards in order.

4. When borrowing books or journals, readers should check for any stains, damage, or missing pages and notify the assistant of any such damages before borrowing materials. A failure to notify the assistant could make the borrower liable for such damages upon returning the materials.

5. Care should be taken to preserve any book or borrowed material. Writing, highlighting or tearing out pages is prohibited.

III. Limits on Number of Copies and Time for Borrowing

1. Each person may only borrow two materials at a time and must return these within two months. When necessary in special cases, borrowing privileges may be extended for two months.
2. If the desired book or journal has been lent out and additional copies are not readily available, the borrower may fill out a reservation form. When the book or journal is returned, the Information Center will notify the reader by telephone and will retain the book for that reader for at least one week.
3. Readers should return books or journals on time. Readers who return books after the due date may be refused further borrowing privileges for the period exceeding the time limit.
4. When it is particularly necessary, the Information Center may ask the reader to return a book or journal at any time.
